# **Recipe of the Month**

A bit of Louisiana inspo in this month's recipe—beignets! Recipe by Taste of Home

## **Ingredients**

- 1/4 cup butter, room temperature
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- I/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons warm water (120° to 130°), divided
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- I package (I/4 ounce) quick-rise yeast
- I large egg
- 3-1/4 to 3-3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- · Oil for deep-fat frying
- Confectioners' sugar
- Berries and whipped topping, optional

Prep time 25min, cook time 25 min. Makes 4 dozen beignets.

### **Directions**

Beat butter, sugar, salt and cinnamon until crumbly. Beat in 1/2 cup water and evaporated milk. In another bowl, dissolve yeast in remaining 2 tablespoons water; add to milk mixture. Beat in egg until blended.

Add 2 cups flour; mix until well blended. Stir in enough remaining flour to form a soft dough (dough will be sticky). Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease the top. Cover; refrigerate 4 hours or overnight.

Bring dough to room temperature. On a floured surface, roll dough into a 16x12-in. rectangle. Cut into 2-in. squares. In a deep castiron skillet or deep- fat fryer, heat oil to 375°. Drop beignets, a few at a time, into hot oil. Fry until golden brown, about 1 minute per side. Drain on paper towels. Dust with confectioners' sugar. If desired, serve with assorted berries and whipped topping.

# Montrose Musings...

Many things have changed here in East Montrose over the 35-odd years I've been here. When I see these new structures going up on this lot at Crocker & Fargo, I can't help but think of what stood on that lot, and the people who touched it, over the many years.

Way back a long time ago, the lot always was partially vacant. But on the north end of it was a ramshackle frame structure; it had probably served as a garage to a home that once sat on the lot. It had long ago lost its paint, and it was leaning to the side. Above it was a garage apartment, equally tattered. Both parts of the building sat vacant for years.

Late one night there was commotion and sirens, firetrucks – the dumpster on the property had caught fire! Passers-by, probably, had thought it would be fun to toss burning flammables into the pit. OK, a fun lark. But not when it backs up to a wooden building! Luckily for all, HPD was on the site quickly, and the fire extinguished, with little more damage than smoke stains on the west side of the shack.

But it was becoming clear that this structure was becoming a source of menace to the neighborhood. Even more so when it was discovered that vagrants had found their way inside and taken up residence in the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor apartment. Within a very short time, it became known that the building was being used to make and sell crack (the smokeable form of cocaine). Shady characters came and went at all hours. Yes, our neighborhood was now home to a thriving crack house.

But, really, they weren't hurting anybody (except themselves). Live and let live. Until – Bobby Shriver heard about the drug activity. You see, Bobby ran Houston Aftercare, which was a drug & alcohol rehab place. The outfit owned several homes here, mostly along Welch, and a few other streets, all east of Stanford. All of them were older frame bungalows, all painted white. Bobby and his classy-sassy wife Davita lived in a 2-story white frame house on Welch. The "clients" would start out in the most strict home, and, as they worked their way through the AA steps, would progress to less supervised living in the half-way houses that dotted the area. Here they learned structure like waking up at the same time each day, dressing appropriately, holding down a job, resisting "slips," and etc.

I noticed that people who went through the Houston Aftercare program were invariably quite "gungho" on the AA steps and traditions. I remember running into one of the guys on the sidewalk and starting an innocent conversation about something like mowing the lawn – and he would morph from grass into how a higher power had brought him to confront his weaknesses and overcome them. Bobby ran a tight ship, and Houston Aftercare had one of the best recovery records in the industry, and one of the lowest recidivism rates.

The Aftercare properties also included a meeting house, which was a low white frame building next to the Shrivers' house. Bobby was involved in the neighborhood, and for a while we held our EMCA meetings in their building. Houston Aftercare held a holiday toy drive connected with St. John's

Methodist Church downtown. They would collect the

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The building at the corner of McGowen & Main has been taken over by street artists and all of these images are on one side or another. # Neighborhood Sightings...

#### An anonymous submission

Secretive construction was going on in a vacant commercial building for six weeks at 711 West Gray. Materials were loaded into the building. A construction dumpster filled and removed. Pneumatic hammers were used inside the building for a week. There have <u>never been any permits posted</u> and still are not. Several calls to 311 and the help of our Councilperson Abby Kamin's staff 711 finally got the place red tagged. Which might only delay the inevitable. The 711 W Gray proprietor's stated intention is to open a Hookah Bar, like A'dor at 403 W Gray, with outdoor seating and music. They want to get a mixed beverage restaurant liquor license. 711 W Gray is across the street from Wharton Elementary, which should preclude the chance for a TABC license. Maybe they'll go BYOB. The 711 people applied for a restaurant permit in August which was rejected. Their liquor license was also recently rejected. The secret construction may be to bring it up to restaurant code. A'dor is a colossal, loud, crowded nuisance ruining the quality of life for those on that end of Peden. Traffic is slowed and blocked and there is zero parking on West Gray down there all day. A'dor is not even open all day. Departing A'dor customers pee, barf and do drugs in the yards of people on Peden between Stanford and Taft.

toys ... and then have to wrap them. Only problem was ... they were guys. Guys don't know how to wrap gifts. (No offense to all the men reading this story!) So, for a couple of years, I remember the civic club (mostly women LOL!) joining them in the meeting house, toys and wrapping paper spread all over the floor, tape and scissors flying, and we helped them get their packages wrapped.

The guys were also big on Bar-B-Q. Just about every afternoon they'd be standing outside of "the Big House" with a huge smoker going and meat on the grill. Several times, they provided meat for our annual National Night Out street party.

The guys spent a lot of time sitting out on the front porches of these white bungalows. They kept an eye on goings-on in the 'hood. If you ever needed help with anything, they were ready to jump in. From my house at Stanford & W. Drew, I could see their house (and BBQ smoker!) at Stanford & Welch. One day I was wrestling a galvanized washtub full of soil and English ivy. One of the guys saw me struggling and ran down to help carry it onto my front stoop.

Bobby had them do "good deeds," too. Like helping with maintenance on the 1800's home of the "old lady" across the street ... Turns out that "old lady" was our precious Nell Stewart, who, 35 years later, is 102 years old and still entertaining people with her witty quips. She's moved to a facility off Gessner, but her home still stands, and is being renovated right now.

Some good guys from there continued to have ties to the 'hood even after "graduating" from the AA program. I hired some of them to dig my koi pond years ago. All they wanted was \$50 and lunch from McDonalds. (Side note: The pond was supposed to be 3' deep. At 30", they hit our famed gumbo soil. The shovel literally broke in two. One of them looked up at me and asked, "Miss Julie ... HOW deep did you say you wanted this to be?" LOL! We decided that 30" was fine!) Daniel Williams started a lawn service company and had many clients here. He and I were good friends for years, until he went off to Iran during that conflict. Curtis Moore used the home repair skills he learned working on Nell's house and started his own business, which more or less continues to this day (slowing down as nearing retirement). Curtis remains a close friend of Nell, and connects with her every week.

OK, circling back to the crack house ... Bobby Shriver loved his guys, and he passionately intended for them all to beat their addictions. And he was a man who didn't take no sh!t. No way was he going to stand for drugs / temptation anywhere near his guys. So he set a date, connected with HPD, contacted the city for permits, hauled boards and plywood, and rounded up a bunch of his hammer-handy guys. They descended on the building, the cops rousted and tossed out the thugs, there was a flurry of activity, and within a few short hours the structure was boarded up and secure from druggies and threats. Oh, and the dumpster was hauled away.

Some EM residents didn't like the Houston Aftercare outfit. The "guys" didn't look like most of us, and they spent a lot of time sitting idly on their porches, watching people. In truth, it was an asset to the community. And immensely beneficial to the clients it served. There are very few drug / alcohol recovery programs that were so well-run or so successful. Sadly, the driving force, Bobby Shriver, fell victim to a merciless bone cancer. He succumbed within a year. Houston Aftercare left shortly after that. You can find a Chronicle story on-line by Googling "Houston After Care Leaves East Montrose" dating to 2004. (Information for that story was submitted by Gayle Ramsey, who is a whole 'nother EMCA newsletter story in itself!)

Houston After Care left, most of the white frame bungalows were torn down, townhomes and single-family residences were erected. Eventually the wooden garage on the vacant lot was razed. For a long time, the cab of a semi-tractor trailer was parked on that lot overnights. Probably the owner / driver lived in one of the homes or apartments near there. Made sense to me. But I guess some residents didn't like it (it didn't look like most of us??), complained, and it eventually disappeared.

Oh, and there was also a shooting next door ... but this story is getting long, so I'll save that tale for another newsletter issue. It'll be shorter – I promise.

The lot held a lot of water, for some reason, so it was often marshy. Don't know if that had to do with it, but in recent years a fairy ring would appear on the lot. What's a fairy ring? A fairy ring is a naturally-occurring phenomenon made of mushrooms. They appear right after a rain, and they grow in a perfect circle, maybe 10' diameter. In English and Celtic folklore, it's said that they're caused by fairies or elves dancing in a circle. Some say they bring good luck, some say bad luck. Step into one – or not? Whatever, this being Montrose, the alure is too hard to resist. I recall driving past some evenings after a rain when the circle had popped up, and seeing free spirited-looking folk sitting on the grass inside the circle.

Now the grass, tree, and fair ring are gone. A residential community is sprouting up on this plot of East Montrose history. I'm looking forward to meeting the new homeowners, and telling them about our neighborhood.
