## **Security update**

Help protect our neighborhood! The East Montrose Civic Association (EMCA) is kicking off our 2024-2025 campaign to rehire S.E.A.L. Security through the end of May 2025. The campaign will cost ~\$4,500 per month and we need a minimum of 120 neighbors to participate.

Why do we need private security? Because HPD can't patrol enough or respond fast enough.

We are migrating to Billsby, an app to manage our subscriber database. You should have received an email asking you to update your information in Billsby. If you paid anytime between 1/2023 and 6/2023, your next payment will be due on 6/15/2024 for the same (yearly, quarterly or monthly) plan as you were previously enrolled. Payments are handled by Stripe credit, debit and ACH payment gateway.

The patrol cost has decreased a bit and we are offering the following plans:

Mid-May, a derecho blew through inner Houston, with wind gusts up to 100MPH. Though short-lived, it left power outages, downed trees, death and destruction in its wake.

A bit of background: a derecho is a *straight-line* windstorm coupled with severe thunderstorms that mainly occurs in the warm weather of summer months. Thunderstorm activity which results in mesoscale convective systems (basically, large interconnected thunderstorms) form where the drafts split into upper and lower level airflows, causing new storm cells to form in the lower level flows. When the convections start moving in linear patterns, the pressure starts to build. Downward air currents coupled with the high pressure following the convections leads to strong storms. Summers are particularly dangerous for derecho formation because the cooler winds in those downward air currents meet the warmth and moisture near ground level and create the right environment for atmospheric instability. Bingo derecho.

In Houston, many still remain without power, and with the temperatures rising, it is vital to check in on your neighbors, family, and friends. Cooling centers are open, and FEMA is providing support on the ground.

# **EMCA Neighborhood Meeting Recap**

On Tuesday, May 21 st at 7pm at Fusion Eats, 30 EMCA members gathered for the May monthly member meeting. Joe Webb, Chair of TIRZ 27 (also known as Montrose Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone), gave a brief talk to the assembled members and then answered specific questions. Because Fusion Eats observes Taco Tuesday (and offers discounts you might want to check out), the restaurant was full and it was difficult to hear the conversation. # History of the Montrose TIRZ

In 2015, the adjacent TIRZ which covers Midtown started the process to annex Montrose into it's coverage area. Local civic leaders learned about this and agreed that Montrose and Midtown are distinct areas with distinct concerns and worked through connections at Houston City Council to prevent the annexation. Within 6 months, the team of residents had completed steps necessary to create the Montrose TIRZ. Joe Webb is Chair of the TIRZ Board and leads the Project & Planning and Finance Committees. He is one of 6 listed board members, all of whom are appointed by the Mayor and Joe is also Principal of Webb Architects.

## What Montrose TIRZ is doing

The boundary's of TIRZ 27 are shaped in a way that resembles window panes (see the zone map). This allows the TIRZ to reach into every neighborhood in Montrose to provide improvements. Among the projects Joe mentioned are: two completed school Spark Parks (Wharton and Arabic Immersion), the completed work on Waugh/Commonwealth bikeways, and Hawthorne Safe Street connection to

Woodhead. He also mentioned that a full roadway reconstruction of Fairview is on the potential project list – but he has no idea when that might happen.

#### How projects have been identified

Projects have been developed after several detailed studies to both identify specific infrastructure conditions and solicit community input. They conducted a walk/bike study and a drainage study among others. Montrose area drainage is really old, Joe cited his street where the system is 110 years old and the old practice of draining to the ends of the street is not adequate. TIRZ 27 got grant funding from HGAC (the Houston Galveston Area Council) to conduct a Livable Centers Study of Montrose. That study identified 10 priority projects.

## Montrose Boulevard Project (Drainage and Mobility)

Improvements to Montrose between the US 59 bridge and Allen Parkway is the biggest project identified. The Montrose Boulevard Improvements Project was designed to address drainage issues while improving mobility, safety, and overall beauty. Planning has been underway for a long time and continues. The project is

divided into two phases. Segment I is from Allen Parkway to West Clay. Segment 2 is from West Clay to the US 59 bridge. Segment I has been designed and the proposed project has been submitted to the City. Joe said it is now 100% in the hands of the city but TIRZ 27 has asked for variances on City requirements per neighborhood input, including the request to avoid placing a sidewalk along the edge of Magnolia Cemetery to avoid disturbing trees and graves. That segment is first and urgent because TIRZ 27 is trying to get ahead of the Ismaili Center which is currently under construction at the corner of Montrose and West Dallas. Joe noted that there has been a lot of confusion about the planned work on Montrose and encourages everyone to get the facts. A primary driver of the project is the need to significantly improve drainage along the street and surrounding neighborhoods. Information about the drainage improvements are available on the TIRZ website. All of the trees in the median will be preserved and an individual protection plan has been developed for each of the trees. No traffic lanes will be removed or narrowed as part of the project. Several residents asked what they could do to move the project along. Joe referred them to a letter which was distributed to all community presidents. If you would like more information please reach out to president.emca@gmail.com.

Joe reassured residents that Segment 2 has not yet been designed in detail and there will be time for the community to participate in planning to be sure that community priorities are incorporated. He encouraged everyone to attend TIRZ meetings, held at St. Stephens at 6:30pm on the 3 rd Monday of every month and to submit any questions or concerns to info@montrosehtx.org

#### Other Projects Impacting EMCA

The project to improve pedestrian safety accessing Wharton School is just getting started. During design there will be a series of public meetings to confirm the details. Joe expects construction to start in approximately a year because that's how long the design, planning, and engagement process takes. He expects the public meeting schedule to be developed within the next 30-60 days and encourages everyone to find out when and where they will be by checking the website.

We have an additional option which is to donate any amount in multiples of \$50 for our pilot program which consists of installing a Flock Safety camera(s) in our neighborhood to help police fight crime and to keep our neighbor safe. Cameras work 24/7, they have license plate recognition and will alert police if a wanted vehicle is in our area and the artificial intelligence creates a fingerprint for each vehicle to help identify characteristics on each vehicle and help law enforcement in any investigation related to our neighborhood. For those of you young'uns who missed Kenny's heyday in the '80's, look up songs like "The Gambler," "Coward of the County," "You Light Up My Life," and that mug-swingin' beer hall singalong "Luille." Kenny also starred in motion pictures.

So, kiddies – see how it pays off to graduate from grade school?

# **Recipe of the Month**

Try this Instapot <u>Chicken Curry</u> by Jess Apfe and let us know what you think! Recipe makes four servings.

# **Ingredients**

- 2 tablespoons olive oil or ghee, divided
- I pound boneless skinless chicken thighs, cubed
- I large onion, chopped
- I teaspoon curry powder
- I/2 teaspoon ground turmeric
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 cup chicken broth

- I can (14-1/2 ounces) diced tomatoes, undrained
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh gingerroot
- I teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- I tablespoon cornstarch
- Hot cooked rice or naan
- Chopped fresh cilantro

# **Directions**

- 1. Select saute or browning setting on a 6-qt. electric pressure cooker. Adjust for medium heat; add 1 tablespoon oil. When oil is hot, brown chicken. Remove. Add remaining 1 tablespoon oil to pan. Add onion, curry, turmeric and cumin. Cook and stir until onion is tender, 3-5 minutes. Add broth, stirring to loosen browned bits from pan. Stir in tomatoes, tomato paste, garlic, ginger, sugar, chicken and salt.
- 2. Lock lid; close pressure-release valve. Adjust to pressure-cook on high for 5 minutes. Let pressure release naturally. Select saute setting and adjust for medium heat. In a small bowl, whisk together cornstarch and 1 tablespoon water. Add cornstarch mixture to pot and let simmer, uncovered, for 5 minutes.
- 3. Serve in shallow bowls with rice or naan. Sprinkle with cilantro.

Bonus: Double the recipe so you have enough for leftovers!
